FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Rabbi David Reiner



Sunday, May 22 was a beautiful day. Nearly 150 congregants gathered at Congregation Shir Shalom for a celebration of our community

and to learn about our Atid Campaign for Our Future. I am grateful to Dr. Jeff and Kim Knispel, Tara and Max Axler, and Dr. Stan and Lynn Broder for sponsoring and helping to organize a fantastic gathering, as well as Dr. Terry and Bob Henry and Mark and Ann Block for helping underwrite some additional costs. I have adapted some

evening.

reflections that I shared that

We have been through a lot over the past nine years, as Jewish Family Congregation and Temple Shearith Israel joined together to become Congregation Shir Shalom. Together we have celebrated and mourned. I think especially of my colleagues, Cantor Kerry Ben-David, and Rabbi Marcus Burstein, of blessed memory. We have witnessed civil unrest and violence and gathered together seeking comfort and strength. We have redefined Jewish community through a pandemic, bid farewell to long serving staff team members, and welcomed new staff and families to our sacred community.

I am also thinking about who I was nine years ago.

My mother died in May 2013, a few weeks before I was starting to serve our community. During her final weeks and in the weeks after her death, I was moved by a group of families who surrounded my parents with love and support. The "Kallah" was formed when I finished Elementary School, from a group of ten-ish families at our synagogue who lived in the same neighborhood and wanted to remain connected as their children went on to different Middle and Junior High Schools. My parents had friends from many walks of life, but the Kallah was different. They met monthly, initially as a book club, with semi-annual gatherings for me and my friends. As we became

adolescents, our parents supported and advised each other. They supported each other through the illnesses and deaths of their parents, through career changes, divorce and their own health challenges, as my genearation married and our parents became grandparents. Together they traveled the East Coast and the World.

This is not a unique experience. I have witnessed a similar phenomenon in our community, as families come together to support each other and celebrate even after their children become Bar and Bat Mitzvah or move out after college.

This is, however, a hope and vision for the future. People want connection and meaning in their

lives and our synagogue is a starting point for enduring and meaningful relationships. Congregation Shir Shalom is uniquely positioned and structured to help form, deepen, and add connections and meaning to our lives.

The Jewish landscape has changed significantly over the past nine years. When I started, there were six more full time rabbis and two more congregations in our area. Danbury had a local Jewish Federation as well as Jewish Family Services.

Six years after Temple Shearith Israel and Jewish Family Congregation united to become Congregation Shir Shalom, after two years of an ongoing global pandemic, we are facing a

> wonderful opportunity to redefine Jewish community, as Jewish communities across the country continue to redefine synagogue affiliation and connection, adapting modes of engagement. We are blessed with an influx of families,

young and old, moving to our area seeking Jewish connection, eager to build and deepen meaningful relationships with Judaism and our community. We are blessed with nearly eighty families that have been affiliated with our congregation for at least twenty years; families that have found connection and meaning in our Jewish community, and are committed to a vibrant Jewish presence in our area.

We are at a moment of inflection. Like the Israelites gathered on the precipice of the Promised Land, we can see a bright future ahead and we have an opportunity to support and shape that future.

House of Connection (Beit Knesset) Fund

House of Prayer (Beit T'Filah) Fund



FORTY YEARS OF THE WOMEN CANTORS' NETWORK

Forty years is a significant amount of time in any circumstance, and in the life of an organization, it gives us a chance to reflect. I thought about what 40 years means in Biblical tradition and was surprised how many references to 40 there are! I knew Moses was on Mount Sinai for 40 days and nights receiving G-d's laws. Spies were sent for 40 days to check out the Promised Land; the prophet Jonah warned Ninevah for 40 days to behave, and the generation leaving Egypt had to wait 40 years before a new generation

was allowed to enter the Promised Land of Israel. That's what Biblestudy.org had to say about 40.

When I think about 40 years of the Women Cantors' Network (WCN), I think about the early days and how vastly different things are now. It is like a totally new generation is in place, and the

changes are seen as natural, and the way things should be. I am amazed at how 40 years has changed the character and behavior of clergy, and for those who haven't figured it out, there are consequences to the sexual and abusive behavior once accepted as the norm.

I remember clearly the insane comments thrown at me as I began my journey as a conservative woman cantor in 1981, after leading services since 1976 in Boston in area conservative shuls.

"What will they think of next?
Topless cantors?" "Breastfeeding on
the bima?" "Anything to bring in the
congregation I suppose" "what will
you do if you have children?" "I guess
they are tossing out kashrut too!"

It was if this was a freak show at a circus- something exotic to gawk at, and ponder how will we even look at, no less hear a woman cantor. If this wasn't bad enough, there was the isolation from any colleagues in my community, and one who actively worked against me; keeping



me from any community concerts and protesting my admission to the Cantors Assembly; after I passed the rigorous exam. The irony was, I was refused admission based on one complaint that my position wasn't "full time" when the Membership chair encouraged me to apply because my "part time" job of 42 B'nei Mitzvah and all services was more than many male cantors full time jobs at the time. A clear example of sexism at the time, that would not be tolerated now.

I would say these experiences made me bolder, made me a bit angry and fearless. What did I have to lose? I began an organization totally open to any woman cantor (and any male who wanted to join) regardless of certification or degree. It was a totally radical idea that we can learn from everyone - there may be someone with no formal training who I can learn from. My goal was to open the doors wide and share any knowledge, music, ideas with anyone who loves being a cantor, or who wanted to be a cantor. It should be a

safe space of music, spirit, and learning. It turns out, it's not such a radical idea, but in 1982 it was seen as heresy.

I was belittled and demonized for many years for "legitimizing illegitimate cantors". As the years went by, people saw that talent and creativity have no boundaries; that we can evolve

and become cantors in more than a few ways.

I always said that not everyone can go to as seminary for 5 years, including a year in Israel if you have a family or a spouse with a job with boundaries. Why punish someone because they need an alternative?

It turns out there are plenty of alternative today! It took a few decades but today there are several paths to getting certified as a cantor. In 1981 that was not the case.

Perhaps I was a bit bold when I proudly told any reporter who asked me about my new position as the second full time conservative female cantor, that "I beat out 18 men who all graduated from the seminaries"

When I began the Women Cantors' Network a dozen women came to a conference I advertised, in Norwalk, CT at my synagogue, Congregation Beth El. Two of those women became presidents of the organization and live on in our hearts. Both were extraordinary; Cantor Sue Roemer z"l and Cantor Doris Cohen z"l. Sue Roemer was the first woman cantor I had heard about. I was studying for the High Holydays at Boston U Hillel with a brave and forwardthinking Rabbi Joseph Polak when he told me, "There's someone who is doing what you want to do. You should meet her. Sue Roemer from the DC area" Sue Roemer showed up at the first conference in Norwalk, and our deep friendship began When Rabbi Jon Haddon, former Director of the School of Sacred Music at HUC met her at a WCN conference years later he proclaimed, "Sue Roemer has more talent in her left pinky than anyone I've ever met!" Here was a

woman who could lift the spirits of a room of strangers and use music as a healing power in ways we barely understood. It was an incredible experience - her music, her teaching, her conducting, her piano and singing, it was a whirlwind of brilliance, heart and soul. She needed a place to share as well, and the WCN became her safe space and home.



Doris Cohen was Sholom Secunda's favorite singer in his choir, and the backbone of anything she got involved in. Solid, caring, talented and smart- Doris became our next president after me and our unofficial historian over the years. She was a beloved cantor in her community and quietly without any fanfare led

as a spiritual leader with a gorgeous voice and soul.

I learned much from these two women of blessed memory. These are the kinds of women cantors that had no professional platform to share and learn,

At the WCN they could get support and sing as a community of sacred leaders. The WCN was and continues

to be a life support for singing spiritual leaders.

At our most recent conference in Oklahoma City, the keynote speaker; Heather Aranyi spoke about "Trauma, Music and the Breath". She told us that communal singing is one of the best things you can do for yourself and for others. As we sang together over several days, in worship and informal song shares, we all experienced a lighter spirit, a deeper breath and a happier heart.

I'm looking forward to the next celebration at 50.

As my cousin, Cantor Leopold Szneer z'l said, "life goes one way - forward".





Terry and Robert Henry



How long have you lived in this area and what brought you here?

We each came to the area for work, Bob in 1978 relocating from Cleveland, Ohio and Terry in 1990 from Riverdale, New York. And from a congregant's standpoint, everyone starts on the outside looking in, and we can make it easier for new people by asking them to help.

People have to be willing to do one thing. Just show up and try it out.
